

Shopping for supplies is my prime task; however, there are so many choices:

Milk -

Long Life: lactose free, full or low cream

Fresh: Hi Low and Skim etc...

Biscuits - savoury, sweet, gluten free and

Milk/dark chocolate

Tea & Coffee - So many brands & varieties

Teas: English, Indian South African, Herbal, and de cafe etc.

Coffees: Instant, ground and coffee bags etc.

Tony Windberg - Beaches & Rocks Workshop



On Tuesday 8th of June, 12 lucky artists attended the workshop hosted by award winning Australian artist Tony Windberg. Tony also holds regular classes in Pemberton

and Northcliffe.

The morning started with an introduction by Tony followed by each artist introducing themselves, the medium they used and what each artist wanted to get out of the workshop.

He explained the colour wheel, how glazing can enhance texture and a translucent glaze over the whole painting can bring the painting all together.

Whilst he was demonstrating his procedures on canvas he explained how light affects rocks and the transparency of water, how objects further away are more subdued with



colour, the use of dry brushing, pallet knives, and how to build up textures by layering. Laying down mid tones first for the rocks, before defining shapes.

Another tip was how using large brushes to paint with, makes you paint looser and

how to use your brush as a measuring tool.

This helps to determine angles, heights and distances, so as not to draw what we THINK we see.

He also expressed the importance of a good canvas, he himself prefers not to use Monte Marte canvases, as you are unable to remove paint with the dilutant you are using, nor are you able to use the "Reduction Method" which is to remove areas of paint using a palette knife. This method can help in shaping the rocks.

Once Tony's painting had finished it was time for lunch.



By this time it was 1pm and we were all ready to sit down and enjoy the wonderful spread put on by everyone.

After lunch it was time to "have a go" and put what we had learnt to practise.

It looked so simple watching Tony, but I must

admit I found it quite challenging. We all brought in our own photo reference to paint, be it in Acrylic or Oil and each painting was unique to the artist.

Tony was a wealth of knowledge and ever so willing to help in anyway.

It was a wonderful day, had by all.

Pastel Landscape Workshop - Rayma Reamy

On Tuesday 15 October 2024 a group of 12 participants were treated to a Pastel Landscape workshop by the lovely Rayma Reamy. Some Dunsborough Art Society members will remember Rayma and her Pastel Seascape Workshop from last year.

Rayma has painted for as long as she can remember, encouraged by her grandmother, and completed formal art studies at two technical colleges in WA. She experimented with different mediums over a number of years until discovering the joys of pastels 25 years ago and belongs to the Pastel Society of Western Australia.

This was a relaxing workshop with Rayma providing the basic equipment, a coloured photo plus several pages of notes, and as we were gently led step by step through the intricacies of creating a rural landscape.

Rayma's five main learning points centred on tonal value, colour contrast, composition, perspective and line control. We found that pastel marks can be hatched, cross hatched, randomly hatched, blended, feathered, blocked in, scumbled and dusted (as in sea spray) but on this day we mostly focussed on blending in the sky and scumbling the remainder of the landscape. We were also treated to a run down on the effective framing of a pastel painting and an accompanying handout with step-by-step details.

We also discussed copyright rules and why some artists prefer that paintings done in a class shouldn't be entered in an exhibition due to, among other reasons, being provided with an image being provided by someone else and well as receiving help with our picture. It was good to be reminded.

Rayma concluded with emphasising that, if nothing else, to go away firstly understanding the concept of tonal qualities, i.e. the dark colours, the mid tones and the light colours, and secondly to be aware of the light source, i.e. if it's an outdoor setting, where is the sun coming from?

Those of us at the Dunsborough Art Society feel privileged to have had the opportunity to be the recipients of Rayma's vast knowledge and experience. With what was provided for us on the day, it was definitely value for money!
